# The Little Prince at The Queen's Hall - feedback

We recently emailed you about a relaxed performance of The Little Prince at The Queen's Hall in Hexham. #### **Activities**

#### You've heard of Knit 'n' natter, how about Proggy mat 'n' chat?

I was thinking recently about how it would be fun to try out some crafting activities from days gone by, and which we (or even our parents) may have enjoyed as children, and this

brought to mind the traditional North East craft of proggy mats, also known as clippy mats. At one time proggy mats would have been made all over the country, but nowadays they're especially associated with Northumberland and Durham mining villages. They're made by stretching a piece of hessian onto a wooden frame, then pushing the ends of a small strip of fabric through the hessian like a stitch, so that the ends form a pile on one side of the mat. This is done using either a wooden tool called a "progger", or even just a whittled down clothes peg.



Originally these were often made with whatever spare materials were available in a household. The hessian could come from an old sack, and the fabric strips could be made from well-used clothes that could no longer be worn. This was usually a winter activity when there was time to be filled in the dark evenings. Before you started, you would need to choose your pattern and mark it out onto the hessian.

Because the mats were usually made with whatever fabric was available, the designs often featured shapes which would be solid colours and then the area around them would be infilled with a mixture of all the other colours of fabric left over.

We were very generously donated some small proggy frames specially handmade for us by a member's husband (thank you John!) and so we ran our first proggy session in February. Carolyn led the session and talked us through the steps and helped us to choose the



right fabrics for our designs. She brought a huge bag of rags and we had a lovely time sifting through the fabrics and choosing colours. The process of making the mats is very slow and methodical and kept our hands busy while we had a chance for a good natter! We took a half time break for tea, coffee and some delicious cheese scones before we got back to work again on our mats. As we got towards the end of the session the patterns began to emerge and we could see the fruits of our labour so we celebrated with more tea, coffee and cake! 

Please can you park behind each other up the side (to get as many cars as possible in) and please don't park right next to the gate if there is still space up the side (it's too hard for people to get past you). If you are worried about getting blocked in please park on the road. I know it is difficult to get a space on the road but sometimes there are spaces to the Corbridge end. The 2 spaces at the door are only suitable for 2 small cars so we have decided that we will make this one disabled space, reserved for members who are in a wheelchair or severely disabled.

# "Personal History of David Copperfield" at Forum Cinema - 24th March

Part of Tyne Valley Film Festival, this screening will be Dementia Friendly, and is "sponsored" by Chrysalis, so please feel free to invite any family and friends to help raise awareness of Chrysalis, and to support our local Film Festival.

A fresh and distinctive take on Charles Dickens' semi-autobiographical masterpiece, The Personal History of David Copperfield, set in the 1840s, chronicles the life of its iconic title character as he navigates a chaotic world to find

his elusive place within it. From his childhood to the discovery of his gift as a storyteller and writer, David's journey is by turns hilarious and tragic, but always full of life, colour and humanity.

The Dementia Friendly Screenings are designed for people living with Dementia and



their carers, or for anyone who would benefit from a relaxed cinema environment, but all are welcome. Providing a comfortable and welcoming environment, the sound is turned down a notch, the lights are on low and people can come and go as they want with unallocated seating. Led by Forum Cinema Hexham, Tyne Valley Film Festival is a community programmed film festival consisting of 29 screenings across 13 unique venues in the Tyne Valley.

# Organ Recital at Hexham Abbey - 16th March


This year is the 50th Anniversary of Hexham Abbey's Phelps Organ - and
